<u>Aloha #104:</u> In October we were still closed for part of the month due to our cooler repair. We held a tailgate party for re-opening and to kick off football. We hosted our annual Halloween Party for the kids on the 28th. We had games, art projects and snacks for the kids. For Auxiliary's Wednesday dinner special we cooked Shepard's Pie. Served approximately 35 meals. Total volunteer hours for October were 76 Hours.

Auxiliary Dinner this month was Hot Pastrami Sandwiches, and it was a HUGE hit. Everyone said how good they were. We held a free breakfast for Veterans-on-Veterans Day. Auxiliary held our annual Holiday Bazaar which went well. We also had a Harvest Dinner for our members. Total volunteer hours for November were 100 Hours. The Auxiliary Dinner this month was Chicken Pot Pie Casserole. We hosted a Christmas party for our members and a gift exchange, we had approximately 38 people participate in the gift exchange. We had a potluck as well that day. On the 23rd we held our children's Christmas Party. This was the best one yet, we had a Santa, Ms. Claus as well as an elf. We had a donation of toys that we were able to wrap and have Santa hand out to the kids. A member read The Night Before Christmas right before Santa entered the room. Lots of crafts and snacks and games for the kids to play. Fun was had by all. Total volunteer hours for December were the highest at 145 hours.

<u>Argonne #56</u>: In October we participated in the annual downtown trick or treat event the City of Sherwood puts on. On the second Tuesday we hosted a taco feed where all profits go towards our girl's state fund.

In November on Veterans Day our post hosted a Veterans Day spaghetti dinner free to veterans and their families. The ALA was responsible for cooking and serving dinner. The day before the City of Sherwood hosted the annual Veterans Day ceremony honoring veterans in our community. Auxiliary members were there passing out poppies and helping the Legion with their table.

In December we were getting ready for our annual Auxiliary giving tree. We helped 24 families, 83 children in total. We also partnered with Sherwood Elks who provided nonperishable and perishable foods to each family.

<u>Banks #90</u>: Most of this period focused on the celebration and sharing during the holidays. We continued to support the Post by hosting 1-2 of the weekly community Bingo nights per month and supplied two gift cards to use as holiday prizes. We decorated the Post for the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays and partnered with the Post for our annual Christmas Dinner both with food prep and in the purchase of multiple door prizes. We donated \$300 to the 3 local veteran homes/hospitals, money toward the Commander's/President's fund, and for the first time bought a wreath through the Wreaths Across America program. During the community's Christmas Light Parade, we took pictures of the Post carrying the flag and shared them with the Post. On the business side, we reviewed our 2024 activity calendar, acquired a new member, and officially submitted a change to our unit's name with the Department so that it matches the post.

<u>Cannon Beach #168</u>: This year we are continuing our 'Bake-less Bake Sale' fundraiser. It has proven to be more successful than the regular bake sale we had in conjunction with our summer Craft Faire. In addition, there is a small craft fair on the 3rd Saturday of each month through the winter. Our local artists are enjoying seeing the weekend visitors in an indoor setting. Our Craft Faire was a success this summer and we will be continuing with the Garage Sale and Craft Faire next year. No dates have been set yet. We are currently working on the Christmas Basket Program. We restarted our Sunday Breakfast in October, but due to a shortage of volunteers it will not be continued until January. Bunco has also been started up again.

Clatsop #12: Let me get started by saying that our court date has changed once again from December 26th until February 13th. October, we had a meatloaf dinner which went off without a hitch. November, we had a zoom VSO meeting which was rather interesting, quite a bit for local things to do. We also decorated the legion for Christmas. His sons had a veterans brunch which brought in a lot of veterans which was very nice I sat and visited with a few of them which set up to themselves that come to find out they are from one of our local rehab centers and it's a veterans only rehab center and come and find out there and dire need of things, clothes shoes games books etc. so we took up a donation and we took them \$350 for the \$25 gift cards and a bunch of clothing games and shoes and also books. As of such we have adopted them as our local family as it would be. So, we are there in any capacity that we were able to help. December, we had a craft bake sale and it went off very well. It was during bingo, and it was a hit so that's something we plan on doing more often. Our dinner for December was stew, it also went very well. Throughout the course of the year the auxiliary has been hosting quite a bit of the bingo games calling taking care of the money setting up what have you, so we've been getting a third of the money which is kind of nice to build up our cash flow again. Mikki took care of all the information that we needed for our insurance. It was sent in it was accepted they're reviewing it now. We should know soon whether they're going to reimburse us, so when that happens, I'll let you know. Memberships are a little bit better than they were last year I've got a little bit better handle on it. We have at least seven new members. We look forward to next year hopefully things will keep going as smooth as they are now that we kind of have a better idea what we're doing, and my letters should be coming monthly now Thank you very much You have a wonderful new year!

<u>Hillsboro #6</u>: A member of Hillsboro Unit 6 helped man the Legion Family booth at Hillsboro's Saturday market the first Saturday in October alongside our Post's Vice Commander. Todd Russell. We also assist with Hamburger/Hot Dog nights at the post on the first Saturday of the month. Our poppy distributions

started October 20th and ran through November 11th at Ace Hardware in Hillsboro. Auxiliary and Legion Members both greeted the public and distributed poppies. Overall, we received \$628.54 donations over four weekends. We received more donations on days when a Legion member was present. November was a tough month for our Unit. We lost two active members, Debra Ashe, and Carole Hockenbarger, within a few weeks. Our Unit is deeply saddened at their passing. We draped our charter in both November and December to honor them and their service to veterans. Our Unit helped with the Early Bird dinner in November. Linda and Rob Liebenow cooked an excellent meal of honey-glazed chicken, orzo, and green beans. We also had brownie ice cream sundaes for dessert. Legion Family leadership served, and post members assisted in the cleanup. It was so much fun working as a Legion Family Team. For December, our Unit is also assisting with the annual Memorial Dinner. We won't be cooking this year, so our focus will be on prepping tables for dinner and doing cleanup following the meal.

Lois Larsen #68: As this year ends and 2024 is just a few weeks away our auxiliary members have been busy this past year would be an understatement. We have added 2 new members to our roster and many veterans have been served. The Auxiliary along with Piercing Arrow Private School students put out 2,279 flags the week of Veterans Day around Clatskanie, Oregon and ended at Copes Park to honor our veterans that were deceased and living! We were able to host our Veterans dinner in November with our District 1 President, Diane Standing and her Vice President, Sherri Russell in attendance. In my wildest dreams I never thought about getting a quit of honor from my commander and I was presented a quilt for my service to my veterans and my community. I was humbled but was so happy to receive such an honorable quilt. I am so proud of my members that cooked and served dinner to 75 veterans and their families. The students at Piercing Arrow Private School set up the hall and cleaned up after the evening came to an end. The Auxiliary honored our commander Jerry Simmons for his 10 plus years of service to our post. We also honored Ronald Mohning, 97 years old and a WWII veteran and 54-year member! It was a night of celebration for us all. We had only 2 fundraisers this year, but the outcome makes it worth all the hard work. We rent out tables at our holiday bazaar and have a bazaar just before Thanksgiving and the last one the 2nd weekend in December. We were able to have a Santa at both events which drew so many families with children. We ended our year with a member Margie Tuomi's retirement party and our Christmas party all in one. We had a gift exchange and goodies to eat. We sang some Christmas songs but of course we had to end with God Bless America. Our attendance at meetings isn't very many so we decided to change it up a bit and hold the first meeting of the new year during the day and hopefully will attract more members. I'm so proud of my unit and the veterans that they serve. They are an amazing group of ladies that are dedicated to serving our veterans. They go the extra mile every time they are given an opportunity to serve. In closing, I thank the ALA organization and God every day for this amazing privilege I must serve my community and serve my veterans. This wouldn't be possible if it weren't for this amazing organization and becoming an ALA member!

<u>Seaside #99:</u> September was our first meeting on the 21st according to ritual. All officers were present, unfortunately no members at large attended. We heard from President Beverly that she was disappointed that there were not any training/learning opportunities at the National Convention. This was a departure from previous conventions. Planning began for Poppy distribution at Safeway for November 9-11 at Safeway. Membership Chair, Beverly Neubecker reported processing renewals and new members. We had one member that reported volunteer hours for Community Service, as she attended the Seaside Chamber of Commerce meetings. We have many members volunteering in the Community. Our membership chair reported that we have transmitted 60 members to Depart Volunteer hours reported were 127.5 as follows: Community Service (72) with 7 members; VA&R (46.5) by 8 members; Legislative (9) by 2 members We distributed poppies, supported the Early Bird Dinner, and began preparations for Toys for Tots. December, we actively support Toys for Tots with many members

helping with toy collection throughout the county. Sorting and counting toys. Separating the toys for Jewel, Cannon Beach, Seaside, Warrenton, and Astoria/Knappa.

<u>Tigard #158</u>: Tigard Unit 158 continues our regular duties: We serve dinner at the Post on the 2nd Saturday of each month (usually earning from \$350 to \$400) and help with yardwork at the Post on the last Sunday of each month. We have members assist the Legion in serving food & beverages at the Post 6 days per week and with the "Vittles for Veterans" program which gets surplus food from grocery stores to local pantries, shelters, and low-income multi-family housing 3 days per week. Members regularly donate their bottles & cans to our Bottle Drop account. In November we held a one-day Holiday Bazaar (earning around \$750) and provided volunteers for a day to assist with shopping & wrapping gifts plus donations of \$1,910 worth of gifts to the Portland VA Medical Center Christmas Gift Shop. In December members assisted the Legion with shopping for groceries and gift cards and with the assembly of Holiday Baskets for just under 100 low-income families plus several veterans living in subsidized housing. In November & December some of our members have been working to gather toiletries, underwear, socks, hats & packaged snacks to deliver to the Salvation Army's Veterans & Family Center in Beaverton.

<u>Washington #2</u>: In October, the Legion and the Auxiliary passed out candy, apples, painted rocks and coloring books at our annual Trick or Treat Day. In November we worked with the Legion at a Veterans Stand down in Hillsboro, Jennings McCall Assisted living, Veteran dinner at the Elks, Christmas party/Vendors with Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus and passed out military painted rocks at the VA Hospital in Portland. In December, we participated in the Christmas Parade, had a gift wrap day for our military family, took the gifts to our family and sent money in for Wreaths across America. We also participated in the wreath auction in Forest Grove.

Service Officer Carol Doege is staying connected with the various care facilities and at this time 80 or more Christmas stockings will be needed. Poppy Chair Report: She is working to see where we can do more distributing of poppies. Auxiliary Prime Rib night KP duty.

SAL Pearl Harbor Breakfast Auxiliary helped. Greens Creations Bring wreath forms, ribbon, Santa hats and décor. Toy shopping for Christmas baskets

<u>Unit 89</u>: Unit 89 has had 3 successful events since September. On Halloween he sponsored a stop on the Candy Trail (Mt Angel's trick or treat with downtown merchants). We set up in the Legion Hall parking lot, gave out treats and Americanism coloring books, stickers, and candy. We had nearly 80 trick

or treaters stop by. (Mind you we are about 6 blocks from "downtown", but many hit us up on their way downtown).

Then in November we had our Poinsettia/Christmas cactus fundraiser sale. We sold 30 plants of various sizes and netted \$286.35 thanks to a \$200 cash donation. Then right on the heels of that fundraiser we worked with the Post at their annual fundraiser (Turkey Shoot) where we sponsored a raffle and sold cookies. This was an inaugural year for this, and we were quite happy with the outcome. We had 2 nice baskets donated, several hats from Tiny's Tavern where the event was held, 10 pies and 2 gorgeous poinsettias donated. We ended up netting \$448. Next year we will have a raffle every half hour, and work on getting more items donated.

Finally, we are nearing the end of replacing the Free Little Library that we sponsor. Our old one had fallen into disrepair, and we hope to have the new one in place by year's end. Our goal is to have a variety of books on the bottom shelf and on the top shelf have items promoting Americanism.

In September, the Unit members cooked and served the meal following the annual 9/11 Remembrance Ceremony which takes place at the Linn County Courthouse.

Michelle Wilkinson contacted the local S.W.A.R.M. group from the local high schools. As a result, they hosted a fundraiser at the Post which helped them raise funds for their upcoming projects. Their supervisor made some awesome enchiladas which they sold "to go" and did well. We hope to do this with them again in the coming months. (est. 15 hours Children & Youth).

In November Michelle, Karen, and Mari assisted in putting together military wedding for a USMC boot. As a result, we gained a new member and the Post gained two.

Unit President Penny McCarthy, I was again requested to produce the parade certificates for the winning entries for the Veterans Day Parade.

Fall Sparkle Bazaar WAS VERY SUCCESSFUL. In December we worked with our Post to provide Christmas gifts for Mercy House families, Sunrise Elementary Title 1 school and resident families in a local recovery program. This is a change from the past few years when the Post held a community wide toy handout at the Heritage Mall. This change has been well received. The Unit members are coordinating the event, and the Post is helping with funding from their Children's Christmas Fund.

<u>Unit #184 Travis Moothart</u>: Unit 184 is a very active Unit working alongside the Legion family and community. The sewing group and Quilts of Valor are active and have made many presentations. The quilts are beautiful. The Unit helped and worked at the community haunted house, prepared meals and worked at the museum. Helped with the Junior Parade in Brownsville. They are involved in many community projects.

Of the 6 Units in District 4, only 3 are now active. I am so proud of these Units and consider myself lucky to be a part of the work being done for the veterans and their families.

- Glenn Morrison #70 Closed as of Fall DEC.
- Grants Pass #28 Closed as of Fall DEC.

- Malin #84 — This Unit is pretty inactive, and I guess this has been the case for some time. I talked to Heidi Cottingham last month and she indicated that Jennifer Smith and herself are the only active members. Heidi has moved to Keno, which is 35 miles from Malin. At this time, Dec. 19th, 2023, there have not been any dues paid for 2024 by any of the 16 members of this Unit. By the way Heidi told me she is very interested in Girls State and youth so I hope she will stay active in some capacity.

- KLAMATH FALLS #8 — This is one of the very active Units and work with the Legion as a family. They work with the veterans, (walk-ins) and make them welcome. They serve them breakfast and lunch, and on Veteran's Day they served 75 to 90 vets FREE. The members lay wreaths at the Veteran's Memorial. This American Legion Post owns it's building, and the Auxiliary have helped with a lot of the remodeling, including a large sum of money donated to the Legion for a new roof. They hold fundraisers, including Pancake Breakfasts and Wine tasting to make money for the maintenance of the building. They have about 40 members and recently had 8 or 9 new members.

- MEDFORD #15 — This Unit meets in the VFW HALL and has not been very active this Winter. One of their big projects is to distribute to the Veterans on Easter, the socks, and undergarments that they have collected all year. They make and sell wreaths with the proceeds going to their Unit. Also, members make Christmas baskets that are taken to the National Guard Armory, for the military and their families.

WILLIAMS #50 — My home Unit has been very active this month making and selling wreaths. The Legion Family; Sons and Auxiliary made about 50 or more wreaths and sold most of them the following week at 4 different venues around Murphy/Grants Pass area.
