Many Units reported on their support of Christmas. We had Units that assisted with the Portland Gift Shop with volunteers, supplies of gift bags, snacks for the opening, and donations. There was also widespread support for our National Guard, some deployed and some not.

Several Units supported the Wreaths Across America program, although there are no specifics as to the complete number ordered or how many utilized the "give back" option for Department.

In December, Units also participated in Legion Family Christmas dinners, parades, and community dinners, etc.

November brought focus to membership efforts. Some Units held "Early Bird" dinners with their Post family. This tradition provides a free meal to paid-up members and those that pay their dues at the time. For the Units with Post homes that utilize key card entry, emphasis is

made in newsletters and bulletins that a 2025 membership card must be shown to receive the new key card.

One Unit reported assisting in the celebration of a WWII/Korean War Veteran's 100th birthday!

October was filled with Halloween fun and costume contests. This was also a month spent distributing donations for Christmas Gift Shops and making plans & budgets executed in December.

Harney County #63:

Post Monthly Yard Sales – 5 members, 64 hours, \$130 in-kind provided by Auxiliary members for volunteers' lunches. This is our main source of funds for our American Legion Family projects.

Trunk or Treat – One ALA and one TAL member participated. 6 hours. Treat Bags contained patriotic toys, puzzles, pencils, and candy. In-kind donations \$215.

Veterans Day Dinner co-hosted by ELKS. Auxiliary provided table decorations and displayed their Wall of Honor, which they add to as more pictures/information are given them by the community. 106 served.

Legion Family Christmas prime-rib dinner. In-kind raffle gifts \$210, consisting of 2 door wreaths, fun gifts and several table decorations. A volunteer Christmas Tree ornament exchange took place. 12 Auxiliary members provided side dishes \$242. Prep, decorating, tear down = 35 hours. 42 attended.

Acts of Kindness: Two disabled individuals are helped continually with groceries, doctor appointments, laundry, cleaning, yard work, etc. 145 hours, 390 miles, \$274.10 in-kind support.

Children & Youth: Lacrosse teams – 2 hours. School fund raiser – 6 hours. Seniors – 30 hours serving food.

Community Service: Local Pow Wow and Senior Center – 32 hours.

279 hours given at the Senior Center helping with Medicare assistance and new enrollment periods.

Ontario Unit #67:

Selling raffle tickets for a donated crocheted Afghan in red, white and blue.

Held a pizza party at a meeting and put together Veterans Parade and Halloween goodies. 12 volunteers, 36 hours.

Finish work for Veterans Parade and Trunk or Treat. 13 volunteers, 26 hours.

Bi-monthly veterans' dinner 3:00-7:00 pm. Hamburgers, hot dogs, 38 attended, 5 volunteers, 20 hours.

Legion Family Trunk or Treat: Pulled pork, rolls, coleslaw and chips 3-5 PM for volunteers. Trunk or Treat 6-8ish PM. Gave out candy, 200 books donated by library, 25 coats and 450 hats, 30 scarves/neck warmers. The Legion Family consisted of 20 workers, 12 were Auxiliary with 60 volunteer hours and \$300 in-kind donations. Approximately 700 parents/children attended.

Veterans Parade: Brunch attended by 10 members, followed with assembly to put banners on parade vehicles. 11 members, 22 hours. Parade: 10 members, 20 hours.

Vet Yoga hour: 6 people attended

Veterans Day: Ceremony (9 attended) and lunch (57 attended). Chicken noodle soup and ham/Swiss butter roll sandwiches. 7 volunteers, 21 hours.

Legion Family Christmas Dinner: 56 attended. 13 volunteers set up, cooked and cleaned up. Auction raised \$140. The auxiliary donated ham, vegetables and rolls to a family in need, \$25; \$100 presented to First Responders (Police and Fire Department). In-kind donations to the Auxiliary totaled \$220.

Prairie Unit #106:

Prepared and served veterans and families during funeral dinners. 75 hours.

Made and placed memorial grave crosses, decorated with poppies made by one of the Unit members. 80 hours. (not reported on last report).

As usual, the Units have been busy helping our Veterans and their families. But this time of year, the biggest projects were the Christmas Gift Shops held throughout the state. Thank you to everyone that helped make that happen with time, money or gifts.

CHRISTMAS GIFT SHOPS

The Veterans Home in The Dalles, was held December 7th and 9th, with 35 volunteers working 180 hours to help 76 Veterans shop for themselves and family members. They drove 4012 miles to accomplish this. The gifts were all wrapped and given back to the Veteran or mailed to family members. They used \$2252 from the Department funds.

If you have Unit members that like to shop, here are some good gifts to purchase. Please try for a \$15-\$25 value, fleece throws(50x60), men's and women's slippers (size med-2x for men and small large for works and small large for w

If the Units can support the gift shop by shopping it really takes some of the pressure off of the ones that organize the gift shop. The Veterans Home in Lebanon, was held December 4, 2024, with 16 volunteers working 64 hours helping 75 Veterans shop for themselves and family members. The gifts were all wrapped before giving them back to the Veteran. They received \$970 in donations and spent \$1000 out of the Department funds. Thank you, Karol Satterfield and your volunteers. Good Job!!

Portland VA was held November 30 and December 2 through 5, 2024 with 44 volunteers from Units, Posts, and SAL Squadrons working 430 hours to help 294 Veterans shop for themselves and family members. The gifts were all wrapped before they were given back to the Veteran or mailed. They received \$19,002 in donations and spent \$2271 of Department funds.

If you have Unit members that love to shop, the Portland gift shop would love for you to spend your Unit money on buying gifts rather than sending money. The gift shop committee has to go out and shop every night after spending all day at the gift shop. There will be sales going on at this time of year. Good gifts would be in the \$15-25 value range. Examples would be, flannel

shirts (large to 2x), pajama bottoms (large to 2x) men's or women's, tools, fleece throws (50x60) and small appliances. And they love the handmade Afghans 50x60.

The Portland VA Christmas Gift Shop has a committee that includes Marie Larson, Brenda Flemming-Wilkes, Barb Sumner and Linda Liebenow. The shop would not go on without all of the hours that all of these ladies put in and the great volunteers. Thank you. Great Job.

Roseburg VA Letters to Santa. The gift shop is a little different at Roseburg VA. Most of the Veterans there are in different living facilities. The Veterans are given a catalog to shop from that has selected gifts available. Then the different organizations get the name of the Veterans and then they shop for the gifts that they have picked out. The gifts are then wrapped and given back to the Veteran. This year we helped 12 Veterans with 30 family members spending \$700 and 10 hours. Our own Department President Cindy Soria is the one that did all of that this year. Thank you. Great Job
