The American Legion Auxiliary National Convention was held in New Orleans, Louisiana August 24 to 29, 2024, with 7 members from Oregon attending.

National President Lisa Williamson was relaxed and had fun with her convention. Always kind and lighthearted she presided with strength but kept her sense of humor. Be the One was promoted everywhere and will continue to be the number one mission of The American Legion and the ALA supports them 100%.

There were nine resolutions with seven being adopted as changes to the National Constitution and Bylaws. We were all surprised at how quickly the resolutions were presented and either adopted or rejected.

The National Officers elected were:

National President Trish Ward, Kansas National Vice President Pam Ray, Illinois National Chaplain Monique Babtiste, Louisiana National Historian Dara Oliver, Flordia Western Division National Vice President Beverly Eads, Alaska The dues increase has put us in the black. The ALA Foundation is \$28,000 in the black. The National Secretary and National Treasurer will not be attending the Inauguration.

There will be no more direct mailing fundraisers sent to our membership. The return on investment has been steadily decreasing over the last few years. Instead, we will be using the "Feathr" targeted mailing program. Which means they will target members who expressed an interest in certain programs etc., with 100% of profits returning to National Headquarters.

I can finally say that all departments that were on probation for various issues have been released from probation as they completed the lists necessary to operate as departments of

the ALA. Yes, I served on one of the committees that interviewed members and researched the issues brought to National. I cannot go into details, but I will reiterate, make sure your documents are in order, have a budget and stick to it as much as possible and remember, those you elect must have the best interest of the organization and its members in mind. Being in a leadership role is not a dictatorship. You do not control the members or situations. Be thoughtful with your words, be kind always and lead by example.

There are a few things to remember: Come to your meetings prepared. Have the most current governing documents with you. Minutes and notes can be used in lawsuits. Executive Session minutes should only include motions with no discussion and limited access to such minutes.

Remember that "Silence gives consent".

The National President wants a nationwide ALA national focus on helping reinvigorate our organization through membership — from the ground up.

District 1 experienced a few bumps this summer with the departure of Vice President, Tracy Peets, due to more immediate obligations. She is a bright and shining light in this organization, District, and her Unit. We are patiently awaiting the time when she is able to return!

Our first meeting was held on Saturday, September 14, at Aloha Post 104. We gathered for lunch at 11:30 and our meeting started at 1:00 PM. We had six (6) Units represented with a total of 21 attendees. The best news is that we had six (six) members that were first time attendees! Woo-Hoo!!

The first order of business was to secure a Vice President. With so many new members present, there was discussion on the duties of the President and Vice President. It was explained that the duties of the VP are not difficult but can be time consuming; also, that it is a great learning experience and an opportunity to meet people and see how other Units operate. Not wanting to place pressure on anyone present, I requested that they consider the opportunity and to reach out if they were interested. Within days, I received an email from Mikkinsy Saling of Argonne Unit 56 (Sherwood) asking if the position was open as she would like to take it. YaHoo!! I am also working on filling the position of Secretary.

Membership was discussed and presented as "the lifeblood of the Auxiliary." Special attention was placed on the positive.

We had an in-depth discussion on membership goals to include the difference between the goal or objective (4,800) vs. the numbers of anticipated actual members (3,900) used in our Department budget. With the number of new members attending the opportunity was taken to explain that our Department operating income is almost exclusively from membership. This includes salaries, taxes, insurance, office supplies and equipment. The generous donations received from individual members and Units are dedicated (designated) to specific programs and cannot be used on office or administrative expenses. A stroll down memory lane pointed out that expenses have been dramatically pared back in the past few years; some previously paid positions have transitioned to volunteer positions, and the Legion graciously removed the Auxiliary obligation for rent and utilities.

The amazing training provided at the convention was discussed, to include the presentation of Mark Seavey, National Judge Advocate. A promise to forward his slide presentation will be completed soon.

Information on the BE THE ONE training was also provided. A discussion was had between this being an initiative (the power or opportunity to act or take charge before others do) and not a program (a set of related measures or activities with a particular long-term aim). Encouragement was given for all to do the training online at legion.org., with emphasis on the benefit of repeating the training as new facets and ideas will emerge with each time.

Eight (8) Units reported. Some gave details as to number of veterans served, hours served, money spent/earned, etc., while others did not. What I can say is that I am in awe of what was accomplished since the end of May, especially considering many of the Units do not meet over the summer.

The Units supported community events and festivals with breakfasts, parades, and Legion Family information booths.

Several fund-raising activities were held to include garage, rummage, and craft fairs. One even has a "bake-less" bake sale!

Many Units support their Legion family in bringing members together with pizza, tacos, hamburgers, etc. For some it generates income and others, aids in fostering relationships among the family members. They also participated in "projects" to improve their Posts.

Unfortunately, there were also memorials to support.

District 1 has internally reported the following statistics: Poppy revenue of \$3,230.99 \$300 to three local veteran organizations Donation of \$225 to National 389 hours in community service 325 hours in fundraising 480 veterans served \$500 spent 295 hours volunteered 1500 hours for ALA & Post functions/activities \$1,900 received for Veterans Fund and Doernbecher Children's Hospital Cash & inn-kind donations received by members. \$3.000 2,100 miles driven \$400 spent in National Security, serving 41 ORANG soldiers, 39 adult family members, and 23 children Attendance at the mobilization ceremony for the 2 Battalion 218 Field Artillery Unit (2-218th FA)

WILLIAMS UNIT #50: Our Unit has been very busy all Summer with Bingo the first Saturday of every month, work parties and other clean up activities for events at our Post. We participated in the 4th of July Parade and helped with funerals in which we served food and anyway we could to help our veterans. One of our ladies sends out birthday cards to our veterans. Another Unit member gathers and takes to the VA, items that are donated. For Halloween we wit(fill little bags with candy to be taken. Our Unit will also fill bags for the kids at "TRUNK OR TREAT". We share our Meeting room with AA, weekly, and also, with our Post's Cub Scout troop. We plan this Fall/Winter to again plan on wreath sales. At this time a tentative date will be to make the wreaths at the end of November and sell the wreaths at a wine-tasting event in December.

DISTRICT 4 MEETING: I've reiterated the importance of practicing the "3 R's"; RECRUIT, RENEW, REJOIN. The Lifeblood of each Unit and the importance of keeping their membership up. The new 2025 cards should not be given out until the dues are paid. I've given out the new Volunteer hours forms and the very helpful 2nd sheet that gave us a lot of information on what we can provide.

Also, I gave a report on the "STAND DOWN" at the Domiciliary in White City, held on July 24th. My husband and I served our veterans by greeting them at the entrance and signing them up, One of the questions we were to ask is if they were "Homeless"? If they answered yes, they were given information that would help them find food, shelter, medical services etc. depending on their need and if they would accept help. Many of the veterans were in transitional housing, some were waiting for a temporary home, others were worried about losing their temporary housing. Final tallies showed that 25 received assistance for housing. One veteran received housing and a job the same day. Many of the 208 veterans that came were wanting help with VA SERVICES, LEGAL SERVICES, DMV, IRS and many others were helped by those and the 56 venders that were present. There were 4 judges, the county DA, and lawyers on site, 29 cases went before the court and 20 were resolved. Fifty veterans were signed in to the VA program for medical help. Sixty-one signed up for work, 3 got jobs right away. Fifteen veterans received help getting their medals.

Many of the veterans were bussed in from Grants Pass area, free of charge. When they got to Medford, they were put on a special bus that took them to the VA center. The homeless veterans were bussed to a special place and received whatever help they needed. All of the veterans and workers received free passes for food, but the need was so great and so many people that the food ran out, but not before the veterans were taken care of.

It was great to be able to help these veterans and to do our small part in making their lives better. We always tried to remember to thank each one for their service. Some of the veterans that were homeless had to bring their wagons or shopping carts. The carts were piled high with sleeping bags, pillows, and their personal items. One old veteran kept us company for a while in the lobby entrance, and he wanted all of us to share in the music he loved from his cell phone. The phone had seen better days, but he played his music very loud for all to hear, it was a kick.
