It's that time of year where choices are being made about the future of our department with those choosing to run for office. As we move forward, I am reminded of where I have been and the journey I had from my Unit, District, Department, to the National organization. Quite an adventure and many friends made along the way.

Recently I attended a funeral for a member of my Post which included a tribute to his late wife, a very dedicated long time Unit member. Placed on a counter for all to see were photo albums full of their family memories. I randomly chose an album to look at and I hit the jackpot, as it was full of memories of our Unit members who have long passed and a few still with us. They included pictures of my daughter at the age of 5 wanting to participate in everything. She's now 34. And Kevin and I were so young. Who were those two people!?

In that moment of seeing these dedicated, caring mentors and friends, the tears flowed for the tremendous loss in my heart but also the loss for my Unit because only two other people in my Unit remember them. The difference they could make today if they were still with us is immeasurable. All their hard work, the incredible amount of fun we had and the difference they made in our Unit and in my life. Learn from the past and remember "it's not so much the loss that's hard to deal with, it's the love they left behind". We all have made life-long friends in the ALA and the memories are priceless.

I've had some of the happiest times in my life in the ALA, and some of the saddest. Yes, misunderstandings happen, even with people you thought were your friends. If the situation is truly unfixable, don't dwell on it. Keep moving forward and don't let the negative bring you down to their level. Never let our members know you have a problem with someone. It's not their business. Stay positive in all situations. Surround yourself with people you can truly trust and choose advisors who have varied opinions, so your decisions are all encompassing.

Learn absolutely everything you can about the ALA and never say I don't know when asked a question. But rather, "let me get back to you as I want to check on something first". That will give you some time to get it right if you're not sure, or if really don't know. But make sure you do get back to that member. Don't drop it. Because it could come back to haunt you. It was important enough for them to ask the question and they deserve an answer.

Strong leadership skills are achieved through experience but also by listening and watching how people react to certain situations. Reading a room is a "thing" and very important when being a guest speaker. Your entire speech could change when you walk into the room, so be prepared.

I cannot guarantee that your journeys will be perfect, but I can guarantee you'll have the time of your life if you choose to run for office. Just remember it's not about you; it's about the American Legion Auxiliary. Put the members and the organization first and you won't regret a moment.

Without a permanent Chaplain, I seek out a volunteer to offer prayer. I like to engage with someone different and come prepared with three invocations and three benedictions typed out so they can have a prepared prayer or speak from their heart. I have found this to be helpful in getting more positive responses from attendees that are not as comfortable with speaking in front of a group. We may actually have a first-time attendee willing to accept the appointment.

There was an in-depth discussion/conversation on upcoming deadlines and activities.

- 1. Convention
 - a. Location and dates | 18-21 June at the Salem Convention Center
 - b. Advertising is a good way to bring information about your community & Legion Family to the entire Department. Maybe highlight an annual community event, like a "cruise-in," or a Legion event, like the Albany Veterans Day parade.
 - c. Registration & Delegate Fees | With newer members in attendance, I took the opportunity to highlight the difference between the two:
 - i. delegate fees translate to the number of votes the Unit is entitled to cast at convention regardless of the number of members that attend) and registration; the fee associated with actually attending the convention, to help with costs associated with program books, badges, ribbons, etc. and
 ii. delegates (general members) and delegates-at-large (members holding department chairs or offices, such as District VP, VA&R Chair, or Girls State Director). This fee is mandatory, naming the delegates is not required with payment.
 - iii. All fees must be paid by the deadline. No monies will be collected on site.
- 2. Poppy Distribution | All Units advised that it would be unlikely they could get additional ready-made poppies for distribution in May.
 - a. They were reminded that Poppy Kits were available from the Department.

 One Unit advised that they purchased a Poppy Kit and make poppies during their meeting, which is a great idea!
 - b. Units were encouraged to begin researching Emblem Sales and/or other Departments for costs and deadlines to ensure they have ample supplies in November.

- 3. Oregon Girls State | We are fortunate to have the Girls State Director in our District and although she attended the Legion District meeting, we were happy that her "Admin Assistant," Sheri Russell, was able to give us highlights!
 - a. Location and dates | 22-28 June at Oregon State University.
 - b. Events | Tuesday all citizens from Girls & Boys State would travel by bus to the State Capitol for a tour and to meet legislators and hear from guest speakers.
 - c. Spread the word | Applications and all pertinent information is available at https://alaoregon.org/girls-state/. Reach out to local schools, homeschoolers, and friends to find applicants.
 - d. Sponsorship | If you are having difficulty getting access to the schools or cannot find applicants, consider sponsoring a qualified potential citizen that does not have a Unit to sponsor them. Just let the Department know that you have the desire!
 - Deadlines | Notice the dates of our departments two biggest functions/productions. All deadlines must be adhered to for them to be successful.

Four (4) Units reported. One Unit provided the prior quarters minutes, and I receive most minutes from another Unit, so our Book of Reports represents six out of our 10 Units. Some gave details as to the number of veterans served, hours served, money spent/earned, etc., while others did not. I continue to be in awe of what was accomplished between December and February, a time of foul weather plus cold & flu season.

District 1 has internally reported the following statistics:

- Donation of \$400 to National/Department
- 680 hours in community service
- 325 hours of fundraising
- 483 veterans served
- Cash & in-kind donations received by members, \$1,200
- 1,440 miles driven
- \$200 spent in National Security, serving 4 ORANG families, 13 children
